#### WHAT IS THE RAP OVERSEAS ADVISERS AND ADMISSIONS CONNECTION?

The RAP Overseas Advisers and Admissions Connection group consists of nine overseas based Educational Advisers from EducationUSA Centers – U.S. Department of State Affiliated Educational Advising Offices Overseas, who volunteer their time and expertise to assist admission personnel and others at United States tertiary institutions with information which will aid them in evaluating foreign credentials and foreign educational systems as well as supplying specific information based on particular needs. EducationUSA advisers formed this Liaison project with NAFSA in 1997, with the main goal of assisting our stateside colleagues with questions concerning foreign educational systems through a variety of means. Advisers are based at more than 500 U.S. educational advising centers around the world. They are the primary source of comprehensive, unbiased, and up-to-date information about all levels and aspects of the U.S. educational system and serve as a source of information on host-country educational institutions. Each of the Liaisons has a specific geographical area of responsibility. Combined, the Liaison team covers the globe. #### WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF THE GROUP?

Internationalization of U.S. campuses has drawn considerable interest over the last several decades. Each year, more and more institutions become actively involved in study abroad programs and the recruitment of foreign students. Along with an increased interest in internationalization, the need for the ability to access information on various foreign educational systems and their credentials increases proportionately. Although U.S. organizations such as AACRAO and NAFSA assist in providing information which involve equivalency recommendations, changes occur throughout the world's educational systems that taxes the ability of these organizations to keep their information current and valid.

In an effort to assist U.S. institutions with accurate and timely information, the now called RAP Overseas Advisers and Admissions Connection Liaison group was formed. The immediate task was to collect and collate as much information on each of the geographical regions as possible and make it freely available. To this end, Dr. Ildiko Ficzko of the University of Szeged in Hungary and the Liaison for East and Central Europe continuously maintains a website, which provides easy access to educational information on each country of the world. Contact information of not only all the Liaisons but also contact information on Educational Advising Centers plus country educational profiles where available and a myriad of links to specific country information is easily accessible.

In addition to the information available on the website, each of the Liaisons responds to hundreds of questions each year from US institutions. These questions are primarily found from scanning Inter-L postings and from direct contacts.

Despite a phenomenal amount of voluntary effort on the part of the Liaisons, the constant mobility in the field of education in the US impacts on the availability of this information to all who might need it. Not every institution subscribes to the Inter-L. Not every institution is a member of NAFSA. Yet all institutions have the same primary need when dealing with international education. That need is accurate and current information.

The Liaison Group was created so that it may provide, to the best of its ability, information that is both timely and accurate.
