

Overview of Turkish Education System



What is New at the Secondary Education Level?

- Ministry of Education (MEB www.meb.gov.tr)
- High Schools
 - Private high schools: Kolej (College), some offers International Baccalaureate
 - Public HS
 - "Regular" Public HS
 - Super HS
 - Anatolian HS
 - Vocational HS (both public and private)
 - Science High School (both public and private)
- High School Length
 - 4 years (some +1 yr English prep)

Secondary Education Curriculum

- Four main concentrations
 - Turkish Math
 - Math Sciences
 - Turkish Social Studies
 - Language, usually English

Curriculum


- University entrance exam drives curriculum
 - Test and memorization oriented education
 - Less focus on English proficiency
 - Lack of critical writing proficiency
- Curriculum to be reformed by MEB

Secondary Education Volume

- Overall population 75 million
- 1.64 million June 2008 (1.77 million in 2007)
 - As of 2005 HS education is 4 yrs, fewer graduates this year
- 346,924 students scored the minimum to enter a 4 year university and 207.328 were placed in 2007 and approx. 85.000 were placed in two year programs
 - Additionally, higher vocational school entrants
 - "Open University" mostly distance learning (35 programs)

Universities in Turkey

- Higher Education Council (www.yok.gov.tr)
- 15 new universities recently established, more coming!
- 96 (68 State + 28 Private Universities/foundation universities)
- The majority of universities are in the 3 major cities



Some Facts about Turkish Higher Education

- 4 year bachelor's degree
- Private vs Public
 - Costs--\$1,000 vs. \$20,000 or more
- Double major possible in many universities
- Exchange programs available
- Professional degrees (Dentistry, Law, Medicine,
 Veterinary Medicine, Architecture) start day 1 of bachelor's program
- Open University earn degree, credit or simultaneously work on 2nd degree

New Trends: Turkish Student (Im)Mobility

- Foundation universities grant scholarships to the best and the brightest
- Improved quality of academic programs in Turkish universities
- Institutional partnerships: dual diploma (SUNY Program) exchanges
 - 9 Turkish Universities/9 SUNY campuses
 - Started with 350 students in 2003 4 universities
 - 1500 students currently enrolled
 - Graduates as of June '08: 261
- EU exchange programs (Erasmus) since 2004 8,468 students participated (Germany, Netherlands, France, Poland, Italy, Belgium are the top destinations)
- Bologna Process standardization, diploma supplements

Turkish Student Mobility


- 30,000 Turkish students studying abroad
- Top Destinations- Germany, US, France, Austria, UK
- Why Europe and not US?
 - Closer
 - Easier & quicker admission no GRE, GMAT
 - Less costly
 - Financial aid opportunities: Jean Monnet,
 Chevening
 - 1 year Master's degrees

New Opportunities

- New programs (PhD, CC, OG, etc.)
- Increased funding for Fulbright Programs
 - send nearly 70 graduate students per year
- US Embassy-funded programs such as Student Leadership Program (6 week summer program)
- Work and Travel is very popular

Helps to know who they are and where they come from

- IIE collects and publishes student mobility data annually in *Open Doors*, with support from the U.S. Department of State
 - 58 years of trend data on international students and scholars on U.S. campuses
 - 20 years of data on U.S. students abroad

Turkish Students in the US 2006-07

- Turkey is 8th leading place of origin
 - 11,622 Turkish students studying in U.S
- Academic level
 - Undergraduate 28.7%
 - Graduate 57.2%
 - Other 7.8%
 - Optional Practical 6.2%Training

What Do We Mean By Diversity?

Diversity is hard to define in Turkey, a country where ethnic and religious differences are difficult to evaluate.

- In Turkey "diverse" students are:
 - Those from outside the three major cities:
 Istanbul, Ankara, İzmir
 - Those from underprivileged areas
 - especially from the eastern and southern areas of Turkey

Diversity

- Students with modest family means and background
 - lower middle class families
 - children from "blue collar" families
- Limited opportunities to improve English skills
- Less exposure to foreign environments but with potential and motivation to pursue study abroad

How Do We Reach *Diverse Populations*?

- Special trips to schools in provincial areas
 - give presentations on higher education in the US, Fulbright Programs, other funding opportunites
 - distribute handouts in Turkish-our web site is in Turkish www.fulbright.org.tr
- Send department chairs and deans scholarship announcements offered to students in their fields
- Ask department chairs to nominate promising students
- Enlist the help of Fulbright alumni

Reaching *Diverse Populations*

- Through media
 - newspaper advertisement / publicity
 - TV and radio interviews, presentations and information programs
 - articles in educational magazines
 - inserting links to university web and other web sites
 - poster blitz to universities and individual departments
- Inviting media to outreach events

Reaching Diverse Populations

- Cooperating with American Corners
- Established Satellite EducationUSA Centers
- Introduction of Fulbright Programs during ambassadorial and U.S. Embassy staff visits to various cities
- English Teaching Assistants and English Language Fellows at provincial universities to improve the quality of English teaching

Reaching *Diverse Populations*

- Revised Fulbright application requirements
 - no standard test score requirements prior to applying
 - 3.00 minimum GPA instead of 3.20
- Turkish Ministry of Education (MEB)
 (1,000 graduate scholarships/yr)
- Word of mouth

Reaching *Diverse Populations:*The US Dept. of State: Opportunity Grants

- Students of potential but modest means
- •All academic levels
- Started December 2007
- •OG Countries: Belarus, Brazil, Ecuador, Peru, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Nicaragua, Turkmenistan, Tajikistan, Turkey, Ukraine, Russia, and Venezuela.
- Funding can be used for one/some/all of these:
 - * Test prep classes
 - * Test fees
- * Application fees
- * Postage expenses


- * Visa fees
- * Travel to the US
- * Settling in allowance
- * Tuition supplements.

Opportunity Grants Stats

- \$40,000 committed within 2 months
- 32 students selected
- Average funding: \$1,300 per student
- 60% placed in desired programs
- Minimum \$10,000 financial aid from schools
- NEW!! \$300,000 has been committed by USG to Turkey for students arriving 2008 and 2009







- Turkey: for us diversity means economic and geographic variety
- Diversity efforts resulted in an increase from 25 Fulbright applications in 2005 to 836 in 2008
- We traveled to 80+ universities

- Get to know Turkish schools -We can help!

- Display promotional materials in centers
- Let us know what's new!

Recruiting & Admissions: Tips On How You Can Help Students

- Give as much info as possible to college publications like the Collegeboard, Petersons...
- Use local alumni to help you with outreach
- Answer queries with personalized replies and promptness
- Issue I-20s quickly and ask preferred mode of delivery
- Assign (Turkish) students to (Turkish) applicants as mentors

Recruiting & Admissions: Tips On How You Can Help Students

- Put the EducationUSA link on your website
- Put triggers in your application form:
 - Select Country—Turkey—advising center info
- Make applying easy, e.g. commonapp.org
- Ask for feedback on how user friendly your website is
- Put an expenses calculator on your website

Study Abroad

- We can help you find partners
 - Turkish universities do not only comprise archeology and history departments
- Erasmus/Comenius programs very popular in almost all 90 universities
- Get help from your alumni
- USCS-Commercial Service can help you

Student Challenges

- English proficiency to succeed in coursework
- Understanding of and adapting to academic expectations
- Understanding of and adapting to social and cultural norms and expectations
- Learning how to maneuver the system

Special Admissions Consideration

- Provisional or Conditional Admission
 - Acceptable standardized test score(s)
 needed by time of enrollment or by the
 end of the first term (rather than at point
 of admission)
 - Waive testing if minimum GPA is maintained in first term or year
 - Assign prerequisite course work
 - Provide bridge courses

Special Academic Support

- Intensive English study in summer prior to enrollment
 - English language
 - Computer literacy
 - Research skills
 - Test preparation courses
- Targeted orientations
 - Coping skills
 - Managing money; managing home expectations
 - Classroom expectations
 - Social and cultural expectations

Cultural Considerations

- Ongoing mentoring support
 - -Students and faculty
 - -Tutoring and support centers
- Establish student groups specifically geared to diverse student populations
 - Culturally diverse living settings
- Varied range of opportunities and interventions
